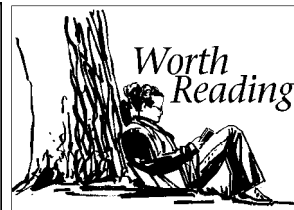

HOLIDAY CELEBRATIONS: KEEP IT SAFE

The holiday season is a fun, magical time for many people. But most of us deal with increased pressures and stress during this time also. As you might suspect, the holiday season then becomes one of the most dangerous times of the year for alcohol-related accidents and even death.

Some of the contributing reasons are:

- More people drink during the holidays due to numerous parties and other festivities.
- Many holiday drinkers don't drink often, so they have a lower alcohol tolerance. They can underestimate their level of impairment and may drive when they shouldn't. If stopped by authorities, they may even be under the legal limit for intoxication, yet are driving poorly.

The holidays are busy and stressful. People are hurrying more than normal and winter road conditions make driving more dangerous. Add alcohol to this scenario and you have a recipe for disaster.

You can make your holidays happier and safer by following these simple tips for consuming alcohol in moderation throughout the season:

- **Just say no.** Resist the pressure to drink or serve alcohol at every social event. Just because it's there does not require you to drink it and there is no law stating that alcohol is a necessary ingredient for holiday cheer.
- **Offer nonalcoholic beverages.** Make your guests feel as comfortable choosing a nonalcoholic beverage as one would choosing alcohol. Put the nonalcoholic drinks in a prominent accessible place to make the choice easier. Remember it's always a good idea to drink a glass of water or nonalcoholic beverage between every alcoholic beverage you consume.
- **Choose a designated driver before arriving at a party.** Decide that drinking and driving is not an option.
- **Don't let your spouse or friends drive if they've had too much to drink.**

Remember that alcohol is a compliment, not the purpose. The main purpose of a party is to have fun with people you know. Drinking is a choice that comes with responsibility.

Automated External Defibrillator (AED) News

WPLC has an AED which is located in the front of the Sanctuary next to the fire extinguisher. An automated external defibrillator is a lightweight, portable device that delivers an electric shock through the chest to the heart. The shock can stop an irregular heart rhythm that could potentially be fatal in a cardiac arrest. A built-in computer checks a victim's heart rhythm through adhesive electrodes. The computer calculates whether defibrillation is then needed. The AED "talks" you through each step of the process and will not let a person "shock" the heart if the rhythm is not life threatening. A person does not have to be CPR certified to use the AED.

I recently put new adhesive electrodes that can be used for children up to age 8 in with the AED at WPLC. Adult pads are already connected to the AED when it is opened. If you are using the AED on a child, you need to disconnect the adult pads and reattach the pediatric pads.

On Sunday, Jan.8, 2012, between and after both services, I will demonstrate how to use the AED to all CPR certified members AND anyone else who would like to learn how to use this lifesaving piece of equipment. **REMEMBER TO ALWAYS CALL 911 FIRST** in any medical emergency!

Project RETURN (Returning Ex-offenders To Urban Realities and Neighborhoods) is an interfaith ministry that exists to help men and women who have experienced incarceration to make a positive and permanent return to community, family, and friends. In the first six months of this year, this organization helped 110 clients find employment. Project RETURN’s website indicates that “employers in a wide variety of fields, such as auto part delivery, landscaping, and home construction, are pleased with the positive attitudes, and quality of work provided by our clients.”

Project RETURN was organized in 1981 to help released offenders to become productive members of society and thus prevent their return to the prison system. For 30 years people in the organization have “walked alongside ex-offenders, providing assistance with employment, housing, and encouragement to change lives and the community.”

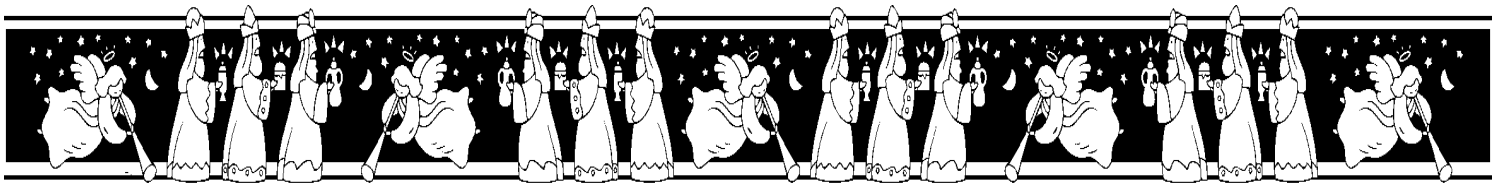

THE ADVENT SEASON, is perhaps the busiest, most hectic times of the year. In the breathless rush to make the most of the season, it is easy to forget that this sacred season is less about “holiday cheer” and more about a “holy child.” Advent is our opportunity –a gift from God in itself –to re-orient ourselves to receive the gift of Jesus. Here, in descending order, are the Top 10 things not to do during Advent.

10. Do not forget your rituals:

Be careful not to treat Advent as just another busy time of the year. When we enter the Advent season, life is supposed to be different. Rituals in your personal and/or family life can help you slow down and prayerfully ponder the gift of the Incarnation, the Son of God made flesh. Take time daily to relax, meditate or pray.

9. Do not add to the frenzy:

If you are a parent, try not to add to the craziness of this season by being frantic yourself about last minute shopping, entertaining or decorating.

8. Do not forget your Bibles:

What Bible passages point to Advent themes of preparation, promise, hope, expectancy, God’s enduring faithfulness, the time when God’s kingdom will be fulfilled? Advent is an excellent time of the year to familiarize yourself again with the Bible’s stories that lead up to the birth of Jesus.

7. Do not try to be perfect for the Holidays:

Believe it or not, it’s not the end of the world if the Christmas tree has a bare sport on one side, a bulb in one of the window candles is burnt out, or if you cannot find just the perfect gift. The holiday season can be stressful enough without the drive for perfection to overwhelm you.

6. Do not over do your schedule:

Learn to say “no” to some of the demands or events that may beg for your presence, however enjoyable or good they may be. Know your limits.

5. Do not overdo gifts:

It is both fun and important to give gifts to our loved ones at Christmas, however remember, the focus is Jesus, God’s supreme gift to us, not our gifts to others.

4. Do not go into additional debt:

It is important to remember that the gift-giving of Christmas is supposed to spring from our gratitude to God for his gift-giving of Jesus. Rather than large grandiose, expensive gifts, consider giving smaller, more thoughtful items.

3. Do not expect the culture to follow your lead:

A truly Christian approach to the month of December will inevitably be counter-cultural. If you embrace much of this list, have faith in what you are doing. Our spiritual health depends on our resisting the cultural message that we need to get out and “shop till we drop.” Jesus came into the world to die for a different reason.

2. Do not forget the less fortunate:

Remember that the real Christmas story is not set in a warm and cozy house, tastefully decorated and filled with more gifts than can fit under the tree, however wonderful that all may be. The real Christmas story is set amidst those who know enduring poverty and danger. What more loving witness could you offer than to seek out some holiday opportunity to identify with the poor and downtrodden as God does?

1. Do not wait until Christmas Eve to come to Church!

Avoid the holiday rush and join us for worship in the weeks leading up to Christmas. Worship in the church is absolutely beautiful this time of year, with beautiful and powerful Advent hymns. Join us for Advent worship and allow it to bring you back to a sense of expectancy and alertness for the coming of God into our world, into your very life.
